- Tom Savage was talking to Brian Leahey, the Paramedic who pilots the drone for the County of Renfrew Emergency Services. Everyone thought it would be a great idea to have Brian give a presentation to the club.
- The Pembroke Airport is celebrating Canada 150 on September 23rd. They have requested that the club provide a static display and a R/C flight simulator for the event. Bob Graham volunteered to supply the flight sim.

• New Drone Rules

- Bob Howard placed an article in the North Renfrew Times and Pembroke Observer a few weeks ago, to bring attention to Transport Canada's (TC) interim orders regarding drones and model aircraft.
- The rules are influx and TC is in the process of developing more formal regulations, which will impact model aircraft and drone operators.
- Individuals who are flying at a MAAC sanctioned field are exempt from the TC rules, since they follow the rules set by MAAC.
- A copy of the TC flyer has been added to the minutes. For a more detailed description of the current rules visit the TC website: <u>Interim Order Model Aircraft.</u>
- Andrew Schenk mentioned that Nav-Can offers a UAV course for \$3000.00, but it is geared toward commercial pilots.
- In order to cover our bases it was suggested that a Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) be submitted to alert pilots that a Model aircraft site exists on the Ottawa river west of Deep River.
- In order to provide a safe and fun flying area for drones, it was suggested by Jim Childerhose that we invite non-members to the field for a day of drone flying. Concerns were raised about non MAAC members using the field and the risk of liability to the club if an accident or injury occurs during the event. A motion was made by Ken Klein that we approach MAAC and ask for recommendations on how such event could be organized and operated with their permission. It was seconded by Jim Childerhose and approved by all.

Flying for fun? New rules for recreational drone users

It's now the law! If you fly your drone for fun and it weighs more than 250 g and up to 35 kg, follow these new rules.

Do not fly your drone:

- · higher than 90 m above the ground
- closer than 75 m from buildings, vehicles, vessels, animals, people/crowds
- closer than 9 km from the centre of an aerodrome (any airport, heliport, seaplane base or anywhere that aircraft take-off and land)
- within controlled or restricted airspace
- · within 9 km of a forest fire

- where you could interfere with police or first responders
- · at night or in clouds
- · if you can't keep it in sight at all times
- · if you are not within 500 m of your drone
- if your name, address and telephone number are not clearly marked on your drone.

If you do not follow these rules, you could put lives, aircraft, and property at risk, and face fines of up to \$3,000.
